


The Ladies Foursome

A NEW HOME FOR LBP?

I'm sure by this time you have all heard that LBP is looking for a new place to build a bigger and better theatre. The first place we were seriously considering was a unit in the Lemon Bay Plaza, about 2 miles up Route 776 from our present location.

Then a building at 190 Dearborn Street went up for sale and we started to look into the possibility of purchasing that facility. It was perfect: a large open space big enough for a theatre and all the accourtements that go with it.

The owner was contacted and negotiations began. We did a property evaluation and found that similar buildings in the area were priced between \$600K to \$800K and that seemed reasonable. In addition, the owner also had two vacant lots right behind the building that, if purchased, could be used for our storage sheds.

We engaged the services of a financial consulting firm, Vera Cruz Advisory, LLC, and they began working on our financial picture and scenarios for acquisition. We contacted a person from Gulf Coast Community Foundation that we had worked with when we raised money to buy the Annex and started looking into a capital campaign.

Then things bogged down. The owner wanted more than the amount that we expected and wouldn't budge on the price. The only way we could swing it was to do a lease-with-option -to-buy. Our financial advisors ran a scenario with this option and presented it to the Board who looked at it closely and determined that we would have to stretch ourselves too thinly to pull it off. If anything happened to the economy within the five year term of the lease, we would lose everything.


The Board wisely chose to pass this up and the owner was informed that we would not be either leasing or buying the building.

We have not given up. We are going to continue to look for available land on or near Dearborn Street and have been researching the construction of a steel building. It has been discovered that they have been used for theatres and churches elsewhere and are much more affordable.

As Englewood grows, we need to keep pace as well and that is what we are intending to do. Stay tuned....

IN MEMORY OF MICHELLE

From her first acting part, through a long list of roles on our stage, she played a wide variety of characters, performing each one with skill and a perfect touch of dramatic flair.

I still remember that evening back in April of 1994 when Michelle came "just to watch", as a friend was going to audition for a part in "The Murder Room," which was scheduled to open the following June 24. But, with a bit of urging from the director, she agreed to read for one of the female roles, and wow! It was obvious to everyone there that this young lady possessed a strong, natural talent. She, of course, was offered a part in that play, which she accepted, and then performed beautifully.

This early success was promptly followed by another important role in the very next scheduled production, which was Neil Simon's, "Plaza Suite," opening just three months later.

From then on, for the next 20 some years, very few seasons went by without Michelle appearing in at least one play, and in several seasons she managed two, for a total of at least 25. And all of these, I must add, got high praise from reviewers in area newspapers.

As time went along Michelle also stepped in to handle other assignments for LBP, such as theatrical coach, play director and member of the Board of Trustees.

During all of those very busy years helping our little theatre bloom, she was also managing a full-time career as an independent insurance broker. Thanks to her versatility and strong work ethic, this venture did quite well and grew to the point that, about three years ago, she had to exit the stage activities that she loved so much, and just tend to business.

For her invaluable contribution to the Lemon Bay Playhouse we are forever indebted. And for her departure from this world we are deeply saddened. Michelle is no longer with us, but her place in our galaxy of stars is permanent.

Sunshine Boys, Comedy by Neil Simon – Alternate Two




SAVE THE DATE BY CRYSTAL COLUZZI
