HEIDI. Oh I really shouldn't. But it is so hard to talk to my parents sometimes. Can you believe it?

HEIDI. Canoodling?

TED. Bingo...so what's the problem?

HEIDI. My mother doesn't really approve. A little overprotective I guess.

TED. Which isn't always a bad thing by the way. ... And your father?

HEIDI. Well dad's pretty cool. But then again he's pretty cool about everything.

TED. And you're really stuck on Armando?

HEIDI. Sure am. From the moment I laid eyes on him. What do I do Ted? I am their only child and I love my parents, but I have dreams of my own. I wanted to travel, experience life...but they needed me and I thought if this restaurant became a success for them they would finally let me go to start my own life.
